
Learn from my mistake(s)....

Part of each EMG member's duties includes reporting their hours online. Your best bet is to establish a routine/schedule for this task. Trust me, you do not want to be doing this last minute in December. I speak from experience.

Last year, I made a concerted effort to add my hours on the last day of each month--for the most part I did thru May. Then I got lazy and chose to 'calendar' things in Outlook. Fast forward to November - my subscription to MS365 was up for renewal. This...just happened to be one of two sites that I had forgotten to change my payment info. The subscription had been expired for 2 whole days. Care to guess what happened...?

I should have known better due to a past experience. I do not use *the cloud*--it's just a 'me' thing. When you do not use the cloud, MS does <u>not</u> save your information--and maybe not your programs. This was the second time this happened. The first time, after MS went to a subscription, similar situation. Five weeks went by before I realized I didn't have the use of any programs. I updated the payment info and then had to download all of the MS programs I used--Word, Excel, Outlook, PPT, etc. When I got to Outlook--that was my shock. I'd lost everything was saved there--contacts names, email addresses, mailing addresses, some emails, some folders...and everything



that was in my calendar. Although I caught it sooner this time and did not lose the programs, I had the same result with Outlook--I lost anything calendared for the year. It only upset me because I'd lost all of my EMG hours.

Once I realized my dilemma I backtracked emails, newsletters, FB chat msgs--to figure out what I'd done and when. Thankfully, I had not deleted anything. It took me 5 weeks to sort all of this out and I'm sure I missed several hours. I barely got everything entered--I think my last entry was on either Dec. 30th or 31st.

Establish a practice where you routinely enter your hours whether it is weekly, monthly or right after you've done something. Don't be a Rena and 'think' your information can't be/won't be lost--again.



I'm using a Franklin planner again--a 'thing' from the 90s. I'm also fortunate to have a friend who gives me something (humorous) at Christmas that I can use. This past Christmas...she gave me a 'paper' calendar. Little did she know.

GROUP 6 - ORNAMENTAL SUN-LOVING PERENNIALS...

Ornamental perennials are still the most favored plants in horticulture because they have been selected and bred to fulfill gardeners' demands for beauty. Arguably, these are the best plants collected from around the world and many have been "improved" by hybridization. But success depends on our EMG mantra, "right plant, right place". Plant Ambassador Krystal Barr has focused on ornamentals for years as she downsized her lawns and created her first gardens in Lenexa. After much consideration, Kystal finally settled on three of her favorites, and one that she plans to try.

Sedum 'Lime Zinger' forms a thick ground cover 5" tall and spreading to 18" that acts as a "green mulch", blocking weed growth. This hybrid's light green succulent foliage is edged in red and pollinators flock to the umbels of light pink flowers that bloom in August. In full sun and well-draining soil, it flourishes along edges, in rock gardens and even in containers.



<u>Joe-Pye Weed 'Baby Joe'</u> Eutrochium (Eupatorium) maulatum (dubium). In my garden, this would be a considered a native plant! However, it is a patent-protected hybrid that doesn't come true from seed. Its native parent grows up to 8 feet while this dwarf remains 2 to 3 feet tall. Requirements include full sun and moist soil. The rose-lavender umbels bloom in late summer to the delight of pollinators.

Coreopsis verticillata 'Crazy Cayenne' is another hybrid of a native species, part of the 'Sizzle & Spice TM' series. It is shorter and more compact than the species and flaunts fiery orange flowers in early to late summer. Bees and Butterflies flock to the blooms, while deer usually avoid. Note that hybrids are not necessarily sterile and since they have been bred to have larger flowers and longer bloom-periods, pollinators may even prefer a hybrid over the original species!





Euphorbia X martini 'Ascot Rainbow' is another drought and heat-tolerant member of the ubiquitous Euphorbia family with glowing variegated yellow and pink bracts on 18" stems. This hybrid is at the top of Krystal's shopping list as a new experiment. I've grown it for years, both in the ground and gracing containers. Hardy in our zone 6b winter, it must have well-drained soil or may succumb to root-rot. Mine is spending the winter indoors with only an occasional light sprinkle of water.

AMY'S CHOICES...

Vinland Valley Nursery is well-known for its inventory of natives, but ornamentals are still the most popular plants. Amy has chosen two of her favorites and pollinators agree.



<u>Centaurea montana 'Mountain Bluet'</u>, native to Europe, is the perennial Cornflower, also known as Bachelor's Button. It blooms from May to August in full sun on 18 to 24" stems. Many consider it invasive since it enthusiastically self-seeds and forms colonies, which is perfect for a meadow. Deadhead if you wish good behavior in your garden.

<u>Origanum 'Drops of Jupiter,'</u> an ornamental hybrid oregano, grows 10" tall and up to 24" wide, forming a purple-flowered mat of chartreuse foliage. Like other oreganos, full sun and well-draining soil are mandatory for these Mediterranean natives. The fragrant leaves are edible but too bland to be useful as an herb. Grow for its beauty and pleasing the pollinators.

Vinland Valley Nursery in Baldwin City is owned and operated by Amy Albright and her husband Doug Davidson. Our former EMGs Judy Moser and Ken O'Dell helped Amy and Doug to establish their Douglas County nursery in 1998. Subsequently the MiCo/MdC EMGs purchased their plants on consignment for our annual Plant Sale through Ken O'Dell. When Ken retired in 2014, we began buying our plants directly from Vinland. Like her mother Judy, Amy is a graphic designer and "plant whisperer," who is able to coax life from the smallest seeds and wispiest seedlings. Vinland Valley is a true family business with all three daughters and their significant others plus other employees with over 20 years-experience.

Vinland Valley takes pride in their wide selection of plants grown without the use of pesticides, visible proof that you don't have to resort to chemical warfare to grow beautiful, healthy plants. While they are well-known for their huge inventory of native prairie perennials, they grow a complete range of nursery plants including sun-loving ornamental perennials and annuals as well as shade-loving hostas, heuchera and ferns plus woodland spring flowers. They also offer annual bedding plants in flats, pots and hanging baskets. Their wide selection of succulents and tropicals can create an exotic look in your garden. Herbs and selected veggie seedlings, again grown without pesticides, are provided for the discriminating vegetable gardener. Trees and shrubs include edible fruit trees and berry bushes as well as native and ornamental woody plants and ornamental grasses for landscaping. The Vinland Valley staff offer their customers extensive expertise in selecting and growing plants. We take advantage of this expertise to select the plants that we offer to our customers.

Amy has been a wildlife gardener for over twenty years. As a result, Vinland Valley grows hundreds of host plants for butterflies and other invertebrates as well as plants that provide food and shelter to wildlife, such as birds. Vinland Valley enthusiastically participates in area master gardener and extension events and seeks input from organizations like Monarch Watch for best practices on selecting and growing plants. The current interest in pollinators has made it possible for them to continue increasing their diversity of pollinator garden offerings. They also offer horticultural workshops, which Katelyn has been approving as Advanced Trainings, including classes on Seedstarting, Landscape Design and Nursery Plant Shopping.

Many of us drive to the Baldwin nursery year-round. The pottery barn is filled with terra cotta and ceramic pots as well as seeds, tools, gardening supplies and books. Mulch, compost, and topsoil are available for pickup or delivery. Vinland Valley also provides landscape design, planting and gardening maintenance services! Vinland is truly a full-service operation, owned and staffed by knowledgeable and caring people. We are proud that Vinland Valley Nursery is our Plant Sale partner.



During our plant sale, Vinland Valley will be delivering multiple truckloads of plants to us on April 23rd and will support our sale through Saturday the 26th.
